CARE International in Vanuatu



A leading humanitarian organization with a global presence, working to eradicate poverty since 1945. We champion women and girls, believing they hold the power to lift entire communities out of poverty when equipped with the right resources. In 2024, CARE and its partners worked in 121 countries and helped 53 million people through more than 1,450 projects. Over half of those reached, 55%, were women and girls.

In Vanuatu, CARE has a history of high impact programs that focus on the underserved populations of the remote islands that make up Vanuatu.

What We Do

CARE Vanuatu's programs aim to address the key challenges that communities face: gender inequality and a lack of social inclusion, vulnerability to disasters and climate change, and the need to strengthen and decentralise governance structures.

Gender Equality Program

Takes a family and relationship-based approach to promoting gender equality with a focus on women's leadership and voice.

- 55% of participants reached in FY24 were women.
- Gender Specific Projects: Gender Equality Together (DFAT), Pacific Partnerships for Gender Equality (ANCP DFAT), and Vois Blong Mi (DFAT).

Reslience program

Strengthens community and provincial level coordination and seeks to strengthen gender and social inclusion in subnational preparedness and response, including increasing resilience to natural disasters and climate change.

- 550 people reached through establishing 55 Community Disaster and Climate Change Committee (CDCCC) members in FY24.
- Approximately 40, 000 to benefit with supporting 7 Area Councils in draft disaster response plans.
- Current Projects: Disaster READY 2.0 (DFAT).



Inclusive Governance program

Supports communities to increase citizens' participation in government-led planning processes to further strengthen the effectiveness, efficiency, and accountability of the services they receive, including disaster planning and response.

- 651 direct project activity participants reached across
 Central Tanna (with approximately, 7000 people) in FY24.
- Project: Pacific Women Lead (SPC).

Emergency response

We work closely with the National Disaster Management Office to support preparedness, response and recovery for disasters.

- CARE's implementation of the Women and Girls Friendly Space (WGFS) in Blacksands, Port Vila, as part of the recovery efforts following the 17 December 2024 Efate Earthquake in Vanuatu.
- Mental and Psycho-social support, and sexual & reproductive services to approximately 1200.
- 518 menstrual hygiene management (MHM) kits and dignity kits.
- · Distribution of 800 trays of seedlings.
